Community gardens are common, a community garden with a 5 acre vineyard as part of it is uncommon, a working winery within the community garden has to be a rarity. Gold medal wines produced there only add to the mystique.

Too few of our members made that discovery when we visited but those who did go would say that you missed something special. David Smith and his wife Pat share a passion for good wine and food and their story is unbelievable. The winery started as a Knox Council venture then was sold when the State Government eliminated council indulgences. Novel marketing strategies have enabled David and Pat to bring their winery into prominence in

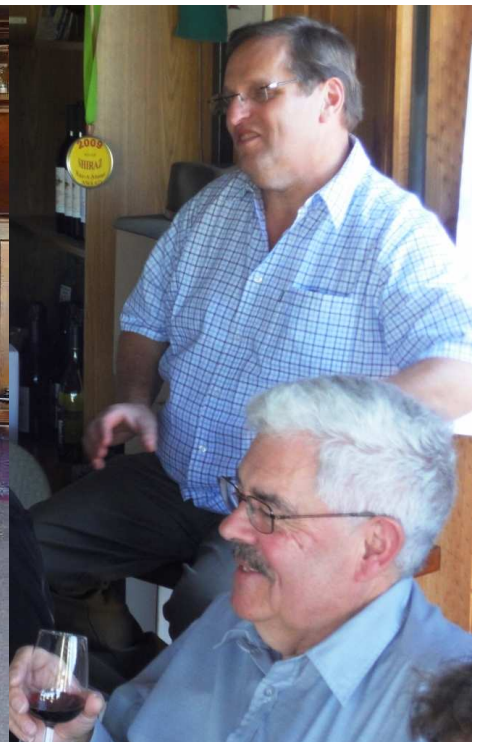
